#### Weaverthorpe Village Hall



The Weaverthorpe Village Hall Committee (WVHC) thought that The Warbler' readers might like to know what is happening in respect of re-opening

the Village Hall (VH). So this is where we are. Of course, everyone is aware of why the VH has not been open for the past few months. But now, as the various restrictions are being tentatively relaxed, the WVHC are working hard to try and get the VH as safe as possible to enable at least one or two of our previous groups to re-start their meetings.

However, as I'm sure you can imagine, this is no easy fix. We have trawled through the various, and numerous, amounts of legislation and documentation coming up with a list of twenty actions we needed to either implement, or give consideration to, before we could at all contemplate any re-opening.

The good news is that we are not too far off having everything in place.

At the moment we are unable to give an exact date but hopefully within the next few weeks. The reasons being that some works, within the VH, have yet to be completed and we have not yet been able to secure all the required safety equipment i.e. gloves, sanitising gel, etc. But these things are in hand and progress is being made.

However, once we do re-open our doors we will be restricted in our numbers and protocols for cleanliness and safe-distancing will be enforcedwith a 'duty of care' being the responsibility of both our hirer's and the WVHC.

On a positive note to finish. Whilst the VH has been closed the WVHC has spent a good deal of time and effort in carrying out refurbishment works within the building. In the main hall the walls have been wood stained, the floor revarnished and new noticeboards purchased. New curtains are also in the pipeline. The kitchen has had new flooring, been painted and deep cleaned from top to bottom - plus new shelving within the cupboards. The toilet corridor has been decorated as have both the ladies and gents toilets. The old chairs have been sold and the new ones are on order. We think we have made good use of the enforced closure and are very pleased with the outcome. You will have to make up your own minds as and when you feel it safe to come along.

When we are ready to open an announcement will be made - probably using 'The Warbler' email listings - and advising of the next steps.

## Quiz Answers

- North Yorkshire County Council unless you live on the A64 then it would be Highways England.
- 2. North Yorkshire County Council unless the school in an Academy.
- Parish Council in most cases.
- NYCC own most lights but in some cases Ryedale District Council or the Parish Council own them. NYCC are contracted to repair and maintain many of them.
- Ryedale District Council but NYCC is responsible for disposing of it.
- The Church, Parish Council or Ryedale District Council depending if it is full or adopted by the Local authority.
- North Yorkshire County Council, Ryedale District Council or even National Parks depending on where you live. The Parish Council are consultees.

The deliberate ambiguity here serves to highlight the complexities of the Local Government structure in place today. For years now, we have been trying to get an acceptable Devolution deal and this would add yet another layer of Local Government on top of all the rest and with every layer, accountability becomes more woolly and efficiency is lost. It is for this reason we have been instructed by government to look at a unitary authority led by a mayor who will have direct accountability. Government would like to see a bid in place by September this year. If the bid is successful, both North Yorkshire County Council and the seven district councils would cease to exist and a completely new and stream lined council would be formed paving the way for devolution. I know concerns have been raised about losing the local voice, but we have a proven record of being able to adapt services across the North Yorkshire footprint to meet local variations. Parish and Town Councils would also be strengthened and given greater powers. The planned 2021 NYCC elections would be postponed and candidates would be asked to stand for the newly formed council in May 2022. If this means we would get more power and more money to spend locally, then I would be only too willing to sacrifice my position to achieve this.
