chairman of the "Looked After Children's Member Group" I take a very active part with these children. At first this was a daunting thought for me, but it has proved to be a very rewarding task.

It has been a great concern that in 2012 we had a rise in young people involved in "stepping out" type pedestrian collisions with vehicles. One thought is that this could be as a result of young people wearing headphones whilst crossing the road. I will be encouraging an awareness campaign on this issue. I am also working to improve the safety of our children on the internet both at home and in schools.

Finally, I am on the lookout for volunteers. I have three primary schools requiring school governors – Weaverthorpe, Sherburn and Hertford Vale at Staxton Willerby. It's a very rewarding job working with young people within our school communities and I always

Weaverthorpe Parish Council

Weaverthorpe Parish Council met on 20^{th} January 2014. The minutes of the meeting are displayed on the notice board outside the Blue Bell Inn and can be read in the comfort of your own home on the Luttons and Weaverthorpe web site. The web a d d r e s s i s: h t t p://luttonsandweaverthorpe.ryedaleconnect.org.uk/

The minutes contain details of the Precept for 2014/15, which has not risen and what is happening about the white lines which were recently painted on Main Road and are now breaking up.

A request was made by Julia Mulligan, the Police and Crime Commissioner to publicise a public consultation regarding the proposed precept for North Yorkshire Police. (For those residents who do not understand the Precept process, North Yorkshire Police raise their funding via the Council Tax, in the same way that the Parish Council does, and that is called the Precept.)

The proposal is that the Police Precept will rise by 1.99% or £407 per annum, or 8p a week for a band D property. The reason for the increase is "alongside work to secure £10m of efficiency savings, (the increase) will help enable North Yorkshire maintain police officer numbers at a time when other forces are shrinking theirs".

This consultation ends on 31st January 2014. I realise that many of you will not receive the Warbler until after that date and I have informed the PCC's office of this. The request to publicise this was only received on 20th January 2014.

Calling local farmers and landowners



Nature conservation charity, the RSPB, would love to hear from local farmers and land managers in who are interested in

helping nature thrive on their land.

The Yorkshire Wolds and Coast is one of the best places for wildlife in the UK and has huge potential to provide even more homes for important farmland birds, as well as other animals from butterflies and bees to hares and hedgehogs.

As a result, RSPB conservation advisor Chris Tomson is offering free advice and support to anyone in the area who wants to manage their land in a more wildlife-friendly way.

As well as advice, the RSPB is also offering farmers in the Yorkshire Wolds and Coast area free farmland bird surveys. These stock takes will show what wildlife makes its home on a farm and, when repeated at a later date, will reveal how a farmer's efforts are producing real results for wildlife.

Paul Weller announces Forestry Commission gigs.



Paul Weller confirmed five forest gigs, appearing as part of the Forestry Commission's Forest live concert programme spectacular woodland locations across the country.

It's been thirty years

since Paul Weller first exploded onto the music scene, suited and booted, and armed with statement tunes in The Jam. Blending the best of British with his love of Motown, Weller crafted a new landscape in the UK music scene thanks to an impressive portfolio of work including amongst others, Stanley Road, Illumination, 22 Dreams and 2013's Sonik Kicks all hitting Number One. A significant figure in popular music for the past three generations, he remains a cultural icon. Forest Live is an independent programme organised by the Forestry Commission bringing music to new audiences without commercial branding or sponsorship. Income from the concerts is spent on improving the woodland for both people and wildlife.

Following on from two sold out Forest Live dates last summer. Paul said of the 2014 shows, "It's a favourite summer jaunt for me so I look forward to performing in a few of the forests that I haven't played in a good while".
