As we entered the first lockdown, decision making powers were delegated to our CEO under emergency procedure rules. The "virtual meeting" soon emerged as a vehicle for the decision making process. This form of meeting was probably never envisaged when legislation around public meetings was agreed.

Agenda items at virtual meetings were debated by councillors in the usual way, but the final decision had to be handed over to our CEO as

there is no provision for a "virtual" vote. I am pleased to say our CEO never strayed from the will of the councillors!

Apart from the obvious, there have been other benefits from the virtual meeting including 131,338 miles not travelled with an associated saving of £55,221 and an estimated saving of 36.774 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions. An estimated saving in terms of time not spent travelling to and from meetings of 5,013 hours or 668 working days is very pertinent to my own circumstance. Pre pandemic I could easily spend around 30 hours a month in travel time and many hours spent away from the community I represent.

Covid figures across the county are now much higher than the England average and are rising. It's clear we will have to live with this virus for a long time to come, so it would seem sensible to put in place small adjustments to protect ourselves. As the old year comes to a close and we look to what the new year holds and how we might keep ourselves safe, somewhere on my wish list has to be revised legislation around the virtual meeting. It would not of course be top of my priorities but could give us a quick fix for just some of the problems we face around Covid safety, climate change and efficient travel around this large county as we move towards a unitary authority.

WEAVERTHORPE SCHOOL CONSULTATION ON CLOSURE

By now, we are sure that you have heard that Weaverthorpe School and Nursery is in real danger of being closed at the end of July 2022.

We recently had a meeting with Weaverthorpe Parish Council, with the County Councillor Janet Sanderson in attendance, and at that meeting the Parish Council have given their full support to helping us to provide input to a consultation which is due to be held in January. The consultation will be for a period of six weeks during which time we hope that we can convince the LEA and the DFE that closure will have a catastrophic effect on the children and the community as a whole.

Shortly there will be a communication which will help us put our views forward by asking people to answer questions about how the closure will affect everyone who has a child of infant and primary school age, or indeed those who are of Nursery age in the catchment area of the school. We are working on the content of this questionnaire at the moment and ask you to take some time to help to try and keep Weaverthorpe School open.

More details will appear in the January Warbler.

About a dozen people in the small Wolds village of Newton Rochford, peered through their windows in increasing dismay as the afternoon of the twenty-third of December wore on. All had hoped that the relentless rain would cease before evening fell and the volunteer carol-singers met in the church for the start of their traditional circuit. As they ate their early dinners, hopes for a dry evening flickered low and finally died.

Nevertheless, they trudged into the ancient church, rain dripping from waterproofs, to be met by the organisers who dispensed hot mulled wine from thermos flasks. Spirits rose, carol booklets were shared-out and promptly at 7.00 p.m. they set forth in waterproofs and carrying brollies as well as torches; not an easy combination.

The route was pre-determined and strenuous, taking in singing outside requested stops and homes occupied by those who were house-bound. Some householders gave donations, but they were not asked for at others. Collecting money for charity brought greater dividends in their last stop – the pub!

They entered through the back door, as previously arranged, and shed their dripping outerwear. Trousers clung wetly, however and feet remained cold and damp. Then through to the large saloon bar, clutching equally damp booklets. Drinks were ordered, the first sips taken to ease dry throats and then a well-rehearsed launch into 'O Come All Ye Faithful'.

Having gained the attention and understanding of the patrons a 'request' session followed. Throats were beginning to swell and close and voices to become hoarse, so, on the final line of the fifth carol, the charity box was passed around and the singers sank onto their bench seats around a long table and drank deeply and with satisfaction, letting the liquid trickle slowly down their throats. Gradually they warmed through and relaxed. Eight o'clock-ish, a bit after; they'd used the hour well.

Suddenly, Patti Stevens sat bolt upright in her corner seat. Everyone stared at her in bafflement. She was biting her lower lip and had a strained look on her face. She had been staring at her list of calls.

"Hannah," she said. "Old Hannah Harding - we've missed her!"

The faces staring at her registered various expressions, but after a minute all came together with the same look of disbelief.

- "We couldn't have!"
- "We did!"
- "How could we do that?"

Babble ensued, but eventually they were all clear. Somehow, whether it was the weather and the desire to be in the warmth or whatever – they had missed the turning to Hannah's; the oldest woman in the village, now confined to a wheelchair and an ex-enthusiastic singer and tireless worker for others.

Recriminations began, but other voices snuffed them out and it was generally agreed that all were responsible.

- "We all walked past the lane end," it was agreed.
- "Yes, we're all to blame."
- "Does it really matter?" came timidly from Sheila in the other corner. "Just a question, really I know it does, now I've said it."
- "She'll be in bed by this time. It's nearly eight thirty. I think her carer comes at eight."

The voices chorused with excuses and reasons; but everyone knew what needed to be done and glasses were drained before they all rose to their feet.
