In an attempt to record the unique celebrations which took place in our valley, it seemed prudent to collect and reproduce reports and photographs of as many of the festivities as possible. So here goes!!

WEAVERTHORPE JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

In spite of the weather, which to be fair could have been a lot worse, we all appeared to have had a fabulous Jubilee Weekend Celebration.

I think everyone will agree that the organisation was excellent and superbly executed throughout. First of all, we, as a village and surrounding community, must thank the organisers for all the effort and hard work put in to making this event happen. In my opinion all those that attended any part of the event have benefitted from being there. Be this from having a long conversation with your neighbour, or perhaps chatting to someone you have never met before. The Dog Show was a great place to meet new people – if only to nod or perhaps get to know someone else's dog's name.

It was in early February that the planning began. Ideas were bandied about but eventually a consensus was agreed as to the number, type and timings for each of the events for the weekends programme.

Planning is one thing, executing the plan is a whole other ball game.

In order to get set up, work started in earnest early on Friday morning with the erection of the main marquee on the Village Green. But some of you may have noticed that the previous Sunday the bunting was strung along the whole village – well nearly the whole village. Thanks must go to the Village Hall Knit and Natter group for their sterling efforts in producing yards and yards of colourful bunting.

Friday pm saw the marquee go up at the Village Hall.

Saturday morning saw the finishing touches to the main marquee, including the putting up of the fairy lights and attaching of the bunting. Seating was brought in - in the form of straw bales - security fencing put in place, the BBQ area agreed and the power cables installed.

On Saturday afternoon the tables and chairs were put out of for Sunday's Afternoon Tea together with trestle tables for the craft displays.

And then the show began.



First off there was a morning walk through the village to find the Best Dressed House'. Stiff competition brought the number of serious contenders down to just over a handful. The Judge had a problem on her hands. Another walk through the village was required in order to inspect again those in contention. And then there were three! Pat Hill from Middlefield Close was the eventual winner – see the picture in this edition.

As evening approached the Weaverthorpe School African Drum players put on an exciting and musical rendition of harmonious drumming at the main marquee. There were some very young drummers - but the output was quite something to listen to. Well done you drummers.

Our live act for the evening was a duo named Marcus and Amanda. They took the stage shortly after 19.00hrs and provided us all with two fantastic 'sets' of

music – many of which the majority of the audience were able all join in. And so the dancing began.

Whilst Marcus and Amanda were performing, and also during their interval, the Hog Roast and Bar-b-Que provided superb victuals – whilst The Blue Bell and The Star Inn supplied the liquid refreshments.

By half past eight all the food had been sold - either it was great food, there was not enough, or



people were hungry – many came back for either an extra burger or hot dog! Judging from the received comments my guess it was the former!!

Marcus and Amanda kept the entertainment going for an excellent second and final set, but the popular music continued for a while from an uploaded phone amplified through the speakers. As the evening cooled people drifted towards the pub of their choice to continue the evenings celebrations.

Sunday morning saw not the best of weather - but at least it was neither

raining nor blowing a gale. The mornings events set off with a superbly well organised Dog Show. This was extremely well attended indeed – both by dogs and spectators. Seven categories were available with many dogs entering at least two categories. What a cross section of breeds was on show - it was just fabulous to see so many dogs and so well behaved. Hardly a cross word between any of them.

As the Dog Show neared its end the children had already taken their places in the main marquee. What fun they all had. Possibly as many as thirty children enjoyed being able to make their own crowns (and possibly

the odd one for Mummy) – with some very imaginative creations. The crown making was accompanied by free juice and homemade ice-cream – Raspberry Ripple for the children and Rum and Raisin for the adults (although the Rum & Raisin did cost $\pounds 1$ per cone).

Back in Mark's Field the Dog Show arena was replaced to make way for the children's games i.e. Splat the Rat, Wellie Wanging and Football Shoot -out. Great fun and all enjoyed by many.

At around midday, at the east end of the village, a display of vintage tractors was available – with, in contrast, an up to date (almost brand new) modern equivalent. What a difference between these machines - the vintage tractors being smaller even than the tyres of the modern colossus.

The other extreme of the village i.e. at the village hall; the crafts people of our community were setting up their displays. And what talent we have amongst us! Quite amazing does not cover what was on display by any means. From hand crafted walking sticks, deadly catapults, paintings which would not be disgraced in the Louvre, quilts, dolls house, flower arranging were just some of the things for people to see and marvel at.

From around two o'clock the fabulous celebratory Handmade Boxed Jubilee Teas were being delivered to the village hall – many of which were enjoyed whilst at the village hall and being entertained by the Pickering Pop Ukuleles. What a lively time was being had by all - with the marquee filled to bursting at one point.

Also at the village hall cakes and tea or coffee were available, as well as a slide show of Old Photos of Weaverthorpe. The latter intriguing many a guest with such comments as 'where was that then?' being frequently heard.

Along the whole length of the village, and up towards the church, groups of people could be seen taking part in the Treasure Hunt – enjoyed by many trying to decipher the 21 clues.

The main marquee was also back in action - the entertainment continuing with Southern Comforts taking to the stage and providing excellent renditions of more popular songs and music.

However, all things must eventually come to an end and towards four o clock the rain had begun - not too hard but, you know, just there! And, by this time, the scheduled events had almost begun to run their course.

An excellent weekend all round enjoyed by many from Weaverthorpe, the surrounding villages and also by visitors to the area.




On behalf of everyone at The Blue Bell Inn we'd like to say a heart-felt thank you for a fab weekend.
