A View from County Hall



This week I am preparing for our first in person County Council meeting since we first went into lockdown and adopted the use of the virtual meeting. As this is the meeting where we set the budget for the final year of North Yorkshire County Council we have to meet in person to make the decision. You wouldn't expect this to cause a problem but as we have to sit socially distanced, we don't have a room at County Hall big enough to accommodate all the councillors and officers safely spaced. One of the topics on the agenda is the continuation of virtual meetings and whereas I do think it's good to meet colleagues and officers in person, for a deeply rural area like The Wolds, it gives us a far greater opportunity to have joined up meetings without having to factor in many hours of travelling time.

The main agenda item is the budget and setting the council tax. I am always deeply aware that the money we spend is YOUR money and I am accountable to you for making it go as far as possible in the most efficient way. It's always a difficult balance between the ability for people to pay and the need to provide and pay for services we are responsible for delivering, the services that help the most vulnerable in our society. The government set a cap on the amount by which we can raise council tax, we have recommended to set below this level and below the latest inflation figure and I look forward to the final debate.

There is yet another hugely important agenda item that I am personally very passionate about and this is the formal adoption of the "Minerals and Waste Joint Plan". Most people don't know about it or even care about it until a development comes forward that has the potential to despoil the landscape we know and love. I found myself in this position back in 2010 when I was defenceless to protect our countryside because of an out of date plan. The plan has since taken many twists and turns over the decade and is now a joint plan with the National Park and City of York. As The Wolds moves towards being a designated landscape "Area Of Outstanding Natural Beauty" (AONB) this is of huge relevance to us. Our campaign did eventually succeed but we will be afforded much greater protection once the plan has been adopted.

Back to reading my 424 page council agenda papers!

Weaverthorpe Village Hall Annual General Meeting Wednesday 23rd March 2022 at 7.30pm

There shall be an annual general meeting of the Village Hall on Wednesday 17th March 2022. The annual general meeting is called by the Executive Committee. The secretary gives at least 21 days notice of the annual general meeting to all the inhabitants of Weaverthorpe.

All the inhabitants shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meeting.

Nominations for election to the Executive Committee must be made by inhabitants in writing and must be in the hands of the secretary of the Executive Committee (Sue Thomson, Gypsy Cottage) by 4th March 2022. Nominations submitted after this date will not be accepted. Should nominations exceed vacancies, election shall be by ballot.

It should be noted that members of the committee also stand as trustees and must be prepared to accept the responsibility associated with the role.

My first bit of news is that we are making progress with regards to the porch extension - three local builders have been approached, each of whom have been asked to provide a quotation for the works.

As most of you will know, Weaverthorpe Village Hall (WVH) is now a registered charity. As such it is a requirement that when such major works as we are proposing are to be undertaken then three quotations are needed. The reality, of course is, that we would probably have done this anyway.

I should tell you that all of the builders are currently very busy - with some of them having works planned well in to the year. On that basis we are not expecting either early quotes or early start dates. But you never know – one, or more, of them may have a cancellation or postponement for some of their work.

So, it is just a matter of time before we receive those returned quotations – after which a construction plan can be formulated.

All the builders have been told that if the works can not be completed in their entirety prior to the Jubilee celebrations then to delay the start until July

We also decided that there was little point in undertaking repairs to the gate and fence (at the bottom of the ramp) until the porch construction is complete.

Elsewhere in this Warbler there will be reference to the Queens Jubilee celebrations – taking place over the weekend of 4th/5th June. WVH Committee will be giving their full support to those celebrations and looking forward to a great weekend.

As many of you may know Weaverthorpe Village are planning all sorts of events over the weekend of 4th/5th June to celebrate The Queens Jubilee.

One of the proposed items is an Afternoon Tea on Sunday 5th between 14.00 and 17.30hrs – whilst at the same time listening to 'Trilogy' and their superb repertoire of chamber music.

The current thoughts are that the Afternoon Teas will be served in boxes, which, it is hoped, will be pre-ordered and collected from either the Village Hall or from one of the marquees in the centre of the village. Tea or coffee will be available at the village hall and also near to The Green in the village centre.

The reason for the teas being in boxes is so that people can collect them and then decide where they would like to sit and enjoy their afternoon repast. Alternatively, for people who are not so mobile, we can arrange for your Afternoon Tea to be delivered to your home.
