Buckingham Palace moving off simultaneously on a single command was an unrivalled spectacle and a masterpiece of coordination. Communities and volunteers across this division joined in with communities across the whole country, celebrating the Big Lunch and The Big Help Out. There was a real sense of the broader national community as we all interpreted the weekend with bespoke versions of the same event. I would like to give thanks to all volunteers across the division who made this weekend so special and for the seen and unseen work they do on a regular basis. 

Helperthorpe Bird Notes

An occasional series from a local birder and sound recordist.



The breeding season is in full swing ... so most mornings am out sound recording ... the go to set up is a parabolic reflector and recorder ... this is the torch beam exercise illuminating a single subject ... focussing on the singer or caller ... also set up a drop rig ... microphone array with recorder ... this is more the floodlight approach ... catching the singer in situ and also making a broad soundscape of surrounding sounds ... it is a favourite of mine and captures movement well ... also allows for long extended recordings ... two of my favourite migrants are getting attention ... the lesser whitethroat ... a skulking grey wisp with a white throat ... fancy that ... it has two songs ... an ululating five ..? note rattle ... and a jumbled repertoire of trills and notes which is captivating ... and as a polar opposite the yellow wagtail ... a vibrant brassy top of the tree show creature ... it has a penetrating zeeeep flight and contact call ... and the song ... a jumble of what might be called musical notes ... has the

inauspicious title of being one of the poorest efforts of all bird singers ... some time has been spent with white throats and chiffchaffs ... often the male bird will escort the female off the nest ... seem to have caught this activity quite a few times with



whitethroats ... while one chiffchaff hitch kicks its song halfway through and you are waiting for another bird to join in only for it to continue on ...

Good to see swallows and house martins returning ... and heard a garden warbler recently ... a bird that was not present last year ..? two other birds missing off the list ... cuckoo ... which might be because its target species are not present ..? and turtle dove ... a bird facing serious decline ...

On manoeuvres sometime this month ... doing a breeding bird survey for the BTO ... thanks to a local villager for showing his two nest rookery ..? and if you have a pond with fish get it covered ... a very early am grey heron has been stalking suitable back gardens ...

Up to three roe deer in the area ... a skirmish between a stoat and a rabbit didn't end as expected ... the rabbit hurtled across the road and a passing car separated the



pair ... if you have not seen news reports of the fin whale stranded on Bridlington beach ... Yorkshire Post have a clip of East Riding of Yorkshire council engaged in removing the beached carcass ... various sites have drone footage of this more than impressive creature ... David Mellor
