soggy start to the year, I am personally preferring it to the black rain. At this side of the valley we have seen several flooding events. Living as I do at the side of the beck, I am very much aware that with the increase in surface water flooding, it can often be the water course that saves an area from flooding, providing it is well maintained. As

budgets are tightened, small maintenance jobs become limited to what the council is only statutorily obliged to provide. For some time this doesn't cause a problem, but as we see greater rainfall, the importance of drainage work becomes apparent and so we all need to think creatively around this subject.

Another tradition of February is our full council meeting where we set the budget. We are all mindful of the difficult job this is as we see many other councils across the country effectively declare themselves bankrupt. The biggest budget pressures nationally are demand led services in Adult and Childrens Social care. Increasing demand for support for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) has risen to an extent that we are projecting an accumulated £13 million deficit by March 2024 in this service alone.

We have worked hard to identify £46 million in savings to be made across the next three financial years. Of

that figure, more than £36 million is set to be brought about by the move to one council. As such, they will not impact on frontline services and are probably amongst the least controversial savings of anywhere in the country. The increased efficiencies include almost £11.8 million from bringing together services, a saving of £6.7 million in support services and nearly £2 million in transforming technology and streamlining IT systems. Income generated through a more coordinated approach to fees and charges is set to see savings of £6.6 million achieved up until the end of the 2026/27 financial year. In addition, £3.1 million in savings have already been secured in the first year of the council's operation through reducing the number of senior managers alongside cutting the number of councillors from 319 to 90 members. Prudent management of the budget will always ensure that we are able to direct services to the most vulnerable in our communities.

HELPERTHORPE VILLAGE GREEN

Due to concerns raised recently regarding the use, or misuse, of the Village Green in Helperthorpe, Luttons Parish Council thought it might be an appropriate time to remind people of the rights and uses of our village greens. Please take note of these. To be clear: within the Parish of Luttons there is only one designated and registered area of Village Green - and that is in the village of Helperthorpe. Also of note is that the Parish Council is the designated 'owner' of that 'green'. Please see the attached plan which shows the designated location and area of that Village Green.

The rights of individuals who may use a village green are outlined in various Acts of Parliament.

Below is a synopsis of some of those rights and exclusions. Please note that only those rights and exclusions thought to be currently relevant have been listed.

A. It is a criminal offence to:

- wilfully take any cattle or other animals on to a green without lawful authority;
- wilfully lay any manure, soil, ashes, rubbish or other material on a green;
- undertake any act which causes injury to the green (e.g. digging turf); or
- undertake any act which interrupts the use or enjoyment of a green as a place of exercise and recreation (e.g. fencing a green so as to prevent access).

B. Can vehicles drive over or park on greens?

• It is a criminal offence to drive over, or park, on land (including a green) not forming part of a road without lawful authority to do so.

C. Can 'works' be undertaken on a green?

- It is a criminal offence to undertake any works on a green which contravene the 1857 Act and works in breach of the 1876 Act will be deemed to be a public nuisance.
- It is a requirement that any fair taking place on a green must first obtain authority to do so.


To be clear: In respect of Helperthorpe Village Green any 'works' that might impede the use of the green by others needs authority from the Parish Council in order to proceed (e.g. the storing of any building materials or associated building equipment will need that authority).

D. Who has the right to enjoy lawful sports and pastimes on a green?

• The right to enjoy lawful sorts and pastimes on a green does not extend to the public at large but is only exercisable by inhabitants of the locality in which the green is situated.

An occasional series from a local birder and sound recordist.



Spent a few mornings pre-dawn putting out microphones hoping to record a covid flock ... the mics are fixed so its pot luck on recording something ... the crows ... rooks ... jackdaw ... arriving from varying directions to feed ... at the beginning of the season the group was easily seen ... a bit of crop growth and they have become invisible ... love just watching late comers swirling in from height ... winging over releasing the air from under their wings ...

A number of birds have started their song ... wren ... chaffinch ... great tit ... and a song thrush ... song is obviously so important in a variety of ways ... a recent study on tawny owls revealed that females can identify when a calling male is at his peak fitness ... males that have a high parasitic infestation and thus not quite healthy their call/song reveals this ... another suggested that when merlins are chasing down song thrushes ... if the bird sings while being pursued the merlin will break off the attack ... song means healthy ... no song ... no song thrush ... who initiates these studies and finds evidence to reach such conclusions ... who knows ..?

Some good flock numbers ... yellowhammer 120+ ... com bunting 15+ ... starling 300+ ... skylark 15+ ... small numbers of redwing and fieldfare ... four tawny owls calling from various points of the compass ... possibly some these may be

youngsters prospecting for new territories ... also listed ... golden plover ... buzzard ... reed bunting ... also hopefully not my only grey partridge for the year ... David Mellor
