How do we group The Wolds communities within North Yorkshire? My conundrum for the next few months. When we rolled eight councils into one unitary council, new wards had to be quickly formed. Wards are the geographic area which an elected member represents and are based on the number of electorate. commission directed us to allocate the new wards based on existing NYCC or District Council wards. Once we had transitioned to the new NYC unitary authority, a complete governance review would be undertaken to make better sense of the communities and this is the job we

have now begun.

Due to the sparseness of the Wolds area, the "Thornton Dale and The Wolds" ward is one of the largest wards in geographic terms. As we transitioned into unitary, the old Wolds ward was originally provisionally placed in the "Sheriff Hutton and Derwent" ward, this probably made sense for the western side of the Wolds ward but not the east side. So it was then provisionally placed to sit within "Hunmanby and Sherburn" ward, but then again, this was not ideal. So after much debate, it was decided to leave it where it was originally, that is, grouped with Thornton Dale and Rillington and this is where it will remain until the 2027 elections.

NYC have now started a full governance review and this will not be limited to the old district boundaries. Now you may consider that this makes the process much easier, but the Wolds area does not have enough population to stand alone. The Wolds communities have their own characteristics, and if protecting your locality brings with it the accusation of being "parochial" then I suspect many of us, including myself, would wear this criticism with pride. So where do we place the Wolds? Do we split east and west, or do we consider the Wolds villages are stronger grouped

together along the Gipsy Race and then, where does Thixendale sit? And just to throw a spanner in the works, many communities sit on the boundary of East Riding and we can't cross this line.

There is a clear need for a governance review at county level, but also for some of the nine Wolds Parish Councils. In respect of Parish Council governance reviews, this may not be necessarily around boundaries, but the imbalance of representation. For example, some large service villages have only seven PC members, some small villages have between nine and eleven members. Rarely do we see true democracy take place as it is exceptional for PC elections to be contested. In fact, I don't remember the district council elections for the Wolds ward ever being contested since I was elected in 2011. I am a great believer in local government, local knowledge is key to community strength but how do we now make it work? One thing I am certain of, is that it will work best if as a broad community, we come up with our own solutions.

Weaverthorpe Parish Council

At a time of ever-increasing costs, with both North Yorkshire Council and Central Government reducing services, Weaverthorpe Parish Council would like to tell you what we have done with the Precept you paid last year.

2024 Precept: The precept is the amount of money that the Parish Council requests from North Yorkshire Council to pay the costs that we incur. These costs include street lighting, grass cutting, insurance and staff costs. Our Precept for the current year 2023/24 was $\pm 5,500$. Through careful management of your money, we have reduced the precept for 2024/25 to $\pm 5,000$, which means a reduction in Council Tax of ± 4.13 pa for a Band D property.

Village Green fencing: In September 2023, a few volunteers from our community including members from the Parish Council replaced the white "birdmouth" fencing around the village green. The total cost of the project was just under £7,700. The Parish Council was able to raise \pounds 7,475 through grants and donations from various organisations so the only cost to the Council Tax payers in Weaverthorpe was £225. Additionally, by carrying the work ourselves we saved the taxpayers an estimated £3,000, by not paying a subcontractor to do the work carried out by the volunteers.

Interest on our Reserves: The Parish Council operates two bank accounts, a current account which allows us to pay our day-to-day costs and a reserve account where we hold a small amount of savings to cover unexpected costs. Up to the beginning of this year that reserve account has earned interest at a rate of 1%. We have just opened a new reserve account which will pay us 4.75% interest, generating income of more than £200 per year.

Monitoring the speed of vehicles through Weaverthorpe

The Community Speed Watch (CSW)) group continues to carry out checks of the vehicles that pass through our village. Over the years that we have been carrying out our deployments we have succeeded in reducing the number of vehicles that exceed the 30 mph speed limit.

We also have a Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) which tells drivers if they are exceeding the speed limit and asks them to slow down. That sign also records data which tells us what the average speed of vehicles is, and also records those drivers that continue to ignore it. In January one vehicle was travelling at 60 mph at four o'clock in the afternoon, which is a big concern.

We would like more volunteers to join the CSW group to ensure that we can continue to reduce the speed of vehicles along Main Road. If you can spare a couple of hours a month to help out you would be very welcome, and would be helping to reduce the possibility of accidents caused by speeding drivers. Have your say on the future of food in North Yorkshire

Hundreds of thousands of residents across North Yorkshire are being urged to help to shape access to healthy foods and cut down on the amount of food that is wasted.

Responses from the 'Let's Talk Food' survey will help to develop ideas to support people to plan healthy and affordable meals and will offer tips on how minimise the impact of food on the environment.

Choosing healthy food options is key to reducing people's risk of a number of health conditions. According to the NHS, in the UK it is estimated that about one in every four adults and about one in every five children aged 10 to 11 are living with obesity.

The climate action non-governmental organisation, WRAP, has said that food waste costs a four-person household about £1,000 per year in food bought, but not eaten.

North Yorkshire Council is leading the way in partnership with the University of York's 'Fix Our Food' team to provide healthy affordable food from sustainable sources, working with a range of businesses and community groups. The county's 615,000 residents are being asked to contribute their views.

There are many initiatives supporting fair access to food across North Yorkshire. Local groups are already creating thriving food spaces for communities across the county and people are benefiting from social supermarkets, community fridges and food-growing projects. North Yorkshire has strong farming links that help to provide the nation's food supplies. It is important to make sure the food produced continues to be affordable and nutritious.

The vice-chair for the Fix Our Food Commission, Jan Thornton MBE, said: "Having the right food available for our residents, and supplied by our local, sustainable food businesses is very important for our future health, economy and the environment. Transforming the food system cannot be achieved by one sector alone - it requires action, knowledge, ideas, a collaborative spirit, and motivation from us all.

"All communities across North Yorkshire, including our rural communities, must have access to healthy food choices and I am really looking forward to being part of this next step in our food transformation journey. It is vital that we keep the food conversation going and the Let's Talk Food survey, is enabling us to achieve this." North Yorkshire's executive member for Health and Adult Services, Cllr Michael Harrison, said: "More than 15,000 Let's Talk surveys have been completed since 2022 as part of our 'Let's Talk' campaign on a variety of topics including the council's budget, devolution and ensuring we serve local communities.

"This new survey on food is an exciting next chapter and is part of our ongoing conversation with the public to help inform council decisions and policies about the things that matter to us.

"I feel very encouraged by the progress that's been achieved to date and I look forward to working with partners and the community to shape the future of food for North Yorkshire.

"Transformation of the whole food system is needed to preserve our planet and maintain and improve the health of local people. The cost-of-living crisis and global events, such as climate change and regional conflicts, are impacting the amount and type of food we are. able to access.

"The issues are complex – but there is positive action that we can all take now to help ensure better food for the future."

The director of public health at North Yorkshire Council, Louise Wallace, said: "We want to understand people's thoughts about eating healthily and what household food gets thrown away, so that we can look at how to reduce the amount of food we waste and make healthy food more accessible. Please do fill in our survey to tell us your experiences as part of the wider conversation about food."

The local food plan will tie in very closely with the priorities of the North Yorkshire climate change strategy from 2023 to 2030, the joint local health and wellbeing strategy, the economic growth strategy, and the Government's own national food strategy.


