A View from County Hall



It's that time of year again when the weather is warming up (or supposed to be) and our Highways team begin their annual maintenance work. Work on the highway is always contentious because when public money is limited, it's never enough! Some roads have to be saved from deteriorating further whilst others get the full works and often there can appear to be no reasoning behind which roads get the attention. Some little used rural roads get the full works whilst other residential roads are subjected to patches on top of patching. Generally, there is a logical strategy to all of this, however, occasionally we get extra money from government which has to be allocated to certain types of highway repairs such as those roads in sparsely populated rural areas.

I am frequently asked about the white identification marks around pot holes being worn away. Residents are concerned that the road defect will be missed out when the repairs in the area are carried out. The Highway Officer will mark the extent of the repairs on his initial inspection, and then take a photo and the photo will be attached to the works order. The gang arriving on site will look at the road and also see the marks on the photo. Sometime there can be delays in getting the repairs carried out. This can be due to a number of reasons such as adverse weather conditions. In some cases, our highway officer may return to site to remark the defects.

Finally, if you need to get a pot hole or other highways defect repaired, the best way to do this is to go through the NYC self report found here -

In our rural areas, it can be difficult to pin point the area to be reported in. More and more people are supplying highways areas with a What3Words location which is always a useful trick to remember when self reporting.

We can't keep everything in tip top condition which means that we are never going to please everyone, however, by following a well thought out strategy, we can at least be fair to everyone and make sure we all get our fair bite of the cake.

Opposite the Village Green.

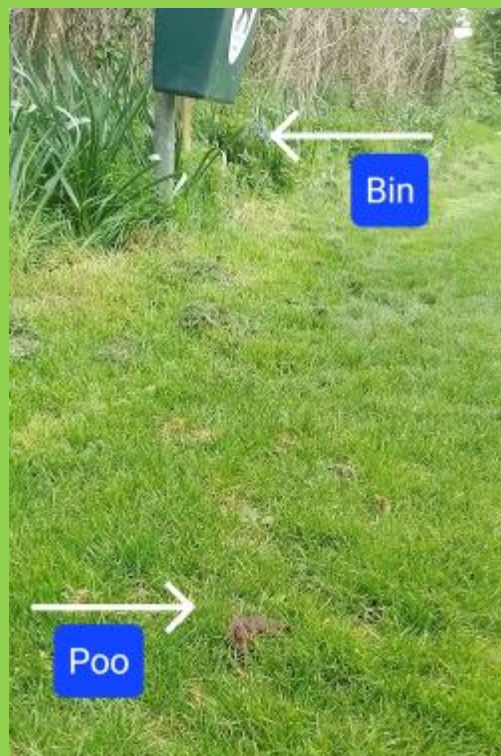

Helperthorpe Bird Notes

An occasional series from a local birder and sound recordist.



Have spent quite a few early mornings making sound recordings of chiffchaff ... first birds heard mid-March ... then a more accessible spot has had two pairs in close proximity ... the binomial is ... *phylloscopos collybites* ... greek ... phyllo + scopos ... leaf + watcher ... greek ... collybites = money changer ... the song akin to the jingling of coins ... habitat is woodland with plenty of ground cover ... their two note onomatopoeic song didn't really appeal at one stage ... though now they have become a joy to watch and record ... can get so close to record their activity and calls ... they are extremely active and make acrobatic sallies to catch insects ... on quite a few occasions have recorded their bill snaps when catching their prey ... it still muddles my mind that they actually nest on the ground ... they weigh less than 9g ... apparently ..? allegedly ..? the same weight as a one pound coin ... used to be the number of paper clips ... remember on a previous patch meeting up with a bird ringer ... the chiffchaff in his hand ... its colours absolutely glowed ... he blew on its belly and revealed the layers of yellow fat being built up for its migration ... one of their wintering grounds is a national park in Senegal ... googled a mythical distance from there to the Valley ... 3,500 miles approximately ... very ... mind boggling ...

As a byproduct of sound recording got 200 pink-footed geese as they passed ... also a roe deer ... other birds ... on the list front ... at least two blackcaps ... lesser whitethroat ... whitethroat ... barn owl ... and sky dancing buzzards ... mistle thrush ... great spotted woodpecker ... and plenty of wrens ... a bit of a pain to sound recording ... though a nice one ... they can just obliterate sound levels when recording other birds ... so loud ...

Like reading bird reports ... and getting hold of the Filey bird report is always a joy ... the standard of production is consistently high ... the artwork and photographs are outstanding ... the bird records are always concise and well presented ... it also covers mammals ... dragonflies ... butterflies ... moths ... it was good to note my all-time favourite moth is also the most recorded ... step forward the setaceous hebrew character ... what a name ... moth names are wonderful ... the only fourth for Yorkshire was the rosy-striped knot-horn ... the report is very useful to compare arrival dates for migrating birds with the status of birds down the Valley ... the only downside is possibly the price ... quality costs ... and that's £15 ... always worth getting previous years as they come relatively that much cheaper ...

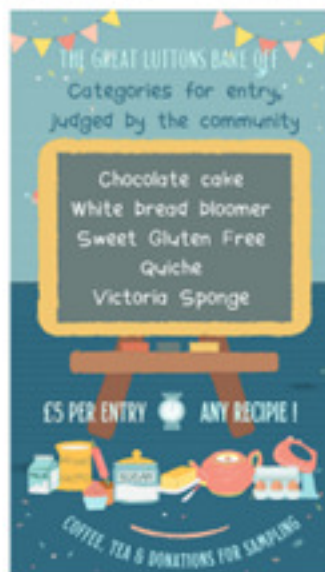
Luttons Monthly Walks

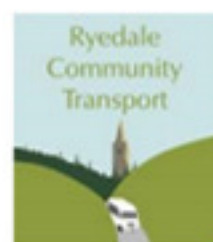
